In conjunction with the fourth biennial Half the World Symposium on Environmental Issues in East Asia to be held March 2-4, 2012 at Hobart and William Smith Colleges in Geneva, NY, the Editors of ASIANetwork Exchange: A Journal for Asian Studies in the Liberal Arts, invites submissions for the Half the World Symposium.
